march to the game.






Football Game Recognition





- Our students could relate to this!



What if....

- You never got to make a mistake.
- Your money was always kept in an envelope where you couldn't get at it.
- You were never given a chance to do well at something.
- You were always treated like a child.
- Your chance to be with people different from you was with your own family.
- The job you did was not useful.
- You never got to make a decision.
- The only risky thing you could do was to act out.
- You couldn't go outside because the last time you went it rained.
- You took the wrong bus once and now you can't take another one.

The following is to help us 'see' more clearly. Look at the chart and say the **COLOUR** not the word


